Re: Gas Tax Review and Information Summary

A local gas tax is one of the options that has been recommended by the Parking, Traffic Safety and Street Maintenance Advisory Commission (PTSSMAC) as a means of raising more revenue to fund street maintenance projects in La Grande. The initial push to establish a gas tax began in 2015 and resulted in a measure (Measure 31-90) being placed on the General Election ballot in November of 2016. The results of the election are shown below with a rough vote of two to one against establishing the tax.

Most cities have difficulty finding ways to fund street surface maintenance needs. City of La Grande's road maintenance costs are currently supported by State Gas tax and the Street User Fee fund. State Gas tax is primarily utilized to maintain street signs, street striping, street lights, patching, street cleaning, and smaller expenditures in dealing with the infrastructure in place. The Street User Fee was developed to deal with the major rebuilds of developed streets and also to be utilized for grant matching

dollars. Current levels for these funding sources are \$950,000 per year for State Gas tax and \$400,000 dollars per year for the Street User Fee.

By establishing a local gas tax, it is estimated that the City could generate an additional \$125,000 to \$175,000 of annual revenue per \$0.01 of assessed tax. This estimate is based on the unaudited distribution and sales numbers reported to the state on fuel sales in La Grande. The reported numbers and resulting revenue projections, based on a \$0.03 per gallon tax, is shown in the table below.

The major direct impacts to consumers would be:

- A fill up of a 20-gallon tank would pay an additional \$0.60 per fill-up with a \$0.03 per gallon tax.
 This would represent what would be considered by consumers to drive to Island City to fill their vehicles.
- It was estimated that 25% to 33% of gas sold in La Grande is transient travelers and another 25% are commuters from other communities. It can be projected that approximately half (50%) of the anticipated revenues from the gas tax would be paid by non-City residents.
- The tax would not affect those service stations outside the corporate limits of the City of La Grande.
- Funding generated from this source would be dedicated to construction, reconstruction, improvement, repair, maintenance, operation and use of public roads and streets as allowed by the Oregon constitution.
- Options surrounding the tax include: seasonal (no tax in winter when travel is lower), fuel type to tax, amount of tax, sunset date, and associated project list.

A local gas tax has the potential to supply funding to expedite the repair of our failing streets, or become a long-term solution for maintenance dollars. If the City decides to pursue a local gas tax, it would need to be placed on the ballot and passed by voters. In the recommendation from PTSSMAC, it was also suggested that a comprehensive public awareness campaign be held in advance of the election to increase the chance of voter approval.
