#### CALL TO ORDER/PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE/ ROLL CALL/AGENDA APPROVAL

Mayor CLEMENTS called to order this Regular Session of the Council at 6:00 p.m. Roll Call was taken and a quorum was determined to be present.

Mayor CLEMENTS stated there was a revised Agenda for tonight's meeting. He also mentioned there was a memo from City Manager STROPE that was placed on the dais regarding street funding for each of the Councilors to read; a copy of which is now a permanent document in the master file for this Regular Session and by this reference incorporated herewith as if fully set forth.

George MENDOZA. La Grande School **District** Superintendent, presented information to the City Council regarding School Bond Measure 31-105, which would be referred to voters on the May 2022, ballot. If the proposed bond measure passed, then the \$4,845,000 bond and matching grant funds awarded from Oregon School Capital Improvement Matching Program (OSCIM) for \$4,000,000 would finance the project to replace the Annex and the maintenance building located at La Grande Middle School and relocate the maintenance department and equipment to a different site. He also shared that the School District recently refinanced the bond that was passed in 2014 and if voters pass the new proposed bond measure, the proposed tax rate was estimated to remain at the current \$1.93 per \$1,000 of assessed property value without adding years to the bond payoff schedule.

Chris PANIKE and Danelle LINDSEY, representatives of the Political Action Committee (PAC), both spoke in support of the School Bond Measure. PANIKE validated the information that MENDOZA shared, stating this was the plan that started in 2020, while he was the Business Manager for the La Grande School District. He shared that the 2014 bond was refinanced, which would reduce the interest rate from 4.75% to 1.69%. If the proposed bond measure passed, due to the refinance, existing tax rates and the term of the bond would be maintained. LINDSEY stated that the Annex Building was being used every day for multiple uses and because the building was almost 100 years old, the opportunity to replace the Annex with a matching grant was the best option.

MIESNER asked if the proposed bond would have the same time period as the original bond, to which MENDOZA answer yes.

In response to Mayor CLEMENTS' question, MENDOZA verified that the original 2014 bond was financed in 2015 for a twenty (20) year loan with only thirteen (13) more years left until it was paid off, which would be 2035. If the proposed bond was passed, it would be paid off at the same time as the original 2014 bond, which would be 2035.

**PUBLIC COMMENTS** 

Mayor CLEMENTS voiced his support for the proposed school bond measure, to which SPENCE echoed his support as well. SPENCE mentioned that adding more gym space to our community for more activities would be great.

In response to Mayor CLEMENTS' questions, MENDOZA answered that this bond would be on the May 17, 2022, ballot and if the measure passed, he was hopeful that construction would start approximately May, 2023.

A discussion was held regarding the roof on the Annex building and that the need to either repair or replace the building has been discussed for several years.

GLABE asked what the construction timeline goal was and if there was a plan to utilize a separate space while the new building would be built, to which MENDOZA stated that his perspective would be to keep the Annex building in place while the new building was being built, which he was hoping the new building would be built closer to 4<sup>th</sup> Street. If the measure passes, the engineers would evaluate the situation to make the final decision as to the best location for the new building.

Teresa GUSTAFSON, Urban Forester for the City of La Grande, stated that La Grande achieved Tree City USA recognition by the Arbor Day Foundation as well as received its Thirtieth (30<sup>th</sup>) Tree City USA Growth Award. She also mentioned that La Grande had received more Growth Awards than any other Oregon city, and tied for Second (2<sup>nd</sup>) in the nation. She gave a brief update on the Arbor month activities and also shared that Saturday, May 7, 2022, would be Community Tree Planting Day.

Brian KELLY, from the Greater Hells Canyon Council and a representative for Oregon Community Trees, gave a brief introduction and overview of the Oregon Urban and Community Forestry (U&CF) Award Program and made a special presentation in honor of Mayor CLEMENTS, who was this year's Oregon U&CF Award recipient.

Ron DAKE, citizen of La Grande, talked about the sewer and water problems at the Union County Fairgrounds and asked the City of La Grande for help. He stated that he wanted to form a committee with other retired Fair Board members to see what they could do to come up with a solution to fix some of the sewer and water issues, to which Mayor CLEMENTS suggested that DAKE involve Union County Commissioner Matt SCARFO with the efforts.

STAFF REPORT

Mayor CLEMENTS requested the Staff Report.

Kyle CARPENTER, Public Works Director

CARPENTER stated that the City Council established a City-Wide Voluntary Sidewalk Local Improvement District (LID) for the year 2021 during the May 5, 2021, Regular Session City Council Meeting. A Local Improvement District offers property owners a way to improve their property and maintain existing sidewalks within the right-of-way. This process assists in facilitating sidewalk repair work upon property owner request and approval.

CARPENTER noted that the 2021 Voluntary Sidewalk Local Improvement District Number 21-066 ended December 31, 2021, with the total cost of projects repaired under the LID being \$16,258.00. Staff monitored approximately seven hundred fifty (750) square feet of sidewalk and driveway repairs, forty (40) feet of curb, and two (2) ADA compliant corner access ramps throughout La Grande during 2021, with property owners either utilizing the citywide concrete contractor or completing the repairs themselves. The City Council accepted the Final Study and Report during their March 2, 2022, Regular Session City Council Meeting.

**STAFF REPORT** 

Mayor CLEMENTS requested the Staff Report.

Timothy BISHOP, Economic Development Director

BISHOP stated that the City of La Grande Urban Renewal Agency (URAC) and City Council met on Monday, March 14, 2022, in a Joint Work Session to review the Proposed Economic Development Strategy for 2022-2024. During the Session, Staff outlined the intent regarding implementation of the Strategy and answered questions. Based on the discussion, revisions were made to Goal 5 related to the Ignite Center. These revisions were reflected on the attachment labeled "Economic Development Strategy 2022-2024" that was included in the City Council packet. Also included was a copy of the draft version from the Work Session labeled "Proposed Economic Development Strategy 2022-2024."

BISHOP noted that the Urban Renewal Agency Agenda for this evening included these same documents for approval as part of the Agency's Consent Agenda. If any changes were made during the City Council meeting, the Agency may want to remove the item from the Consent Agenda so they can be discussed by the Agency before approval or they can approve it as part of the Consent Agenda.

Mayor CLEMENTS felt that the Work Session was productive and validated what the City Council had in mind.

BOZARTH suggested reviewing the strategy every six (6) months to check progression, to which a discussion was held and a decision was made to ask BISHOP to come before the City Council in October, 2022, to give an update on the strategy progress.

b. Consider: Approving Personal Services
Contract for Compensation Survey and Pay
Equity Analysis for Represented Employees

STAFF REPORT

Mayor CLEMENTS requested the Staff Report.

Robert STROPE, City Manager

STROPE stated that Staff was requesting approval to contract with HR Answers to complete a Compensation Survey and Pay Equity Analysis for the represented employees. This would include fifty-five (55) positions across the three (3) bargaining groups. In addition to the Compensation Survey, the consultant would perform an analysis to assure the City was in compliance with the Pay Equity Act. The methodology for determining compliance with the Act must be the same for all employees. The City currently working with HR Answers on the Compensation Survey and Pay Equity Analysis for the Management Group. HR Answers was selected following a process that included a Request for Proposal (RFP) and presentations by other consultants. HR Answers was already contracted to develop the methodology for the Management Group and would apply it to the additional fifty-five (55) positions.

STROPE noted that when the City and the Employees Association negotiated the current Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA), the City also agreed to conduct a compensation study prior to negotiations. Funding for this work was planned to be part of the 2022-2023 Proposed Budget. During the 2022 Council Retreat, the issue of recruitment and retention of employees, particularly in public safety and other hard-to-fill positions was discussed. The Staff has been exploring options to address this issue and concluded that a professional compensation survey The Firefighters' Bargaining Group had was needed. subsequently sent the City a letter requesting to reopen negotiations for the current CBA to help address the inability to fill a vacant Firefighter Paramedic position. Additionally, the current Consumer Price Index (CPI) had risen substantially in the past few months, with the January CPI at over 7%, which was the index the City used for Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) calculations. City employees were expected to receive either 2% or 3% COLA in June, 2022, under the current agreements.

STROPE stated that given the overall circumstances, at this juncture, the City needed to move forward to complete compensation surveys, conduct the Pay Equity Analysis, and develop new pay structures for all employees that would be negotiated with the represented groups. This was not work that could be done without the resources of a consultant which included reviewing every position in the City. Because the additional work for the represented

employees was not included in the 2021-2022 Adopted Budget, City Council approval would be required. In reviewing the estimated expenditures for all departments, the City should be able to absorb the costs without accessing contingency funds. The total cost of the additional work was \$18,500.

STROPE added that the intent would be to open negotiations with all three (3) bargaining groups and use the results to address the compensation situation in terms of recruiting, retention, and pay equity adjustments. They may also request to reopen negotiations with the intent of bargaining new agreements that would become effective before the end of the current agreements which run through the end of June, 2026. The Bargaining Groups would need to agree to enter into negotiations early. Normally, negotiations would begin this winter or early spring 2023 for new three-year agreements effective July 1, 2023.

Mayor CLEMENTS asked what the timeframe looked like and how the City Council would be involved, to which STROPE answered that it would take approximately four (4) months and the Council would be involved if there were going to be any changes in bargaining, salaries, and anything to do with labor negotiations. These types of changes would be discussed during an Executive Session.

MIESNER asked how this would come into play with the current budget numbers, to which STROPE stated that there were dollars already added to the budget in regards to this, but some adjustments might need to be made still.

In regards to Mayor CLEMENTS' question, STROPE stated that the negotiations would start this next fiscal year, to which a discussion was held regarding when each bargaining group would start negotiations and what the budget numbers and timing for completion would look like.

HOWARD asked if a Compensation Study had been done with the City of La Grande before, to which STROPE stated that a salary survey for the Employees Association was completed about five (5) years ago, but a full Compensation Study of this scope had never been done that he was aware of.

STROPE further explained the functions of bargaining and why it was important to compare pay scales for each position and adjust the pay levels where needed.

Mayor CLEMENTS stated that there was an uncertainty with budget numbers, to which STROPE agreed.

MIESNER asked if the proposed funds for the study would be adequate, STROPE said yes.

Mayor CLEMENTS briefly explained the process for appointing citizens to the City of La Grande's Budget Committee. One of the seven (7) public member seats on the Budget Committee was vacant, due to the resignation of Mr. Edward Henninger. Mr. Henninger's term was due to expire on December 31, 2022. Mr. Ammer previously served on the Budget Committee and submitted his application for reappointment but was not selected in January, 2022. City Manager STROPE contacted Mr. Ammer and confirmed he was still interested in serving on the Committee and would like to be considered to complete Mr. Henninger's term.

The following Motion was introduced by CLEMENTS; MIESNER providing the Second:

MOTION: I move that Greg Ammer be appointed to the Budget Committee, for the remainder of a three-year term, which will expire December 31, 2022.

UNION COUNTY COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE

Commissioner Matt SCARFO announced that approximately seventy (70) applications were received from local businesses applying for the Union County Business Assistance Grant Program. Once review of the applications was completed, businesses would be notified by the end of the month.

SCARFO stated that the projection from County Emergency Manager Nick Vora was that Union County would be making another drought declaration for 2022, and approximately thirty (30) out of (36) Oregon counties might be making a drought declaration this year due to the dry climate.

#### STAFF COMMENTS

SCARFO noted that their office was preparing for their budget season.

With the recent loss of Oregon State Police (OSP) Trooper, Marcus McDowell, Chief BELL shared that a memorial service was held in his honor in Wallowa County on Monday, April 4, 2022, which staff members from both City of La Grande's Fire and Police Departments attended. He added that it has been a challenging time lately, but ensured the City Council and community that La Grande's Police Department Employees were doing well and understood the importance of mental health. He gave a brief summary of the different types of programs available to them to aid in their mental wellbeing.

BELL stated the Police Department was currently three (3) officers down and gave a brief update on where they were with the hiring process of a few candidates.

With the current opioid crisis in our community, BELL stated that in January and February, 2021, there were two (2) drug overdose calls that routed through the 911 Dispatch Center compared to January and February, 2022, there were eighteen (18), which was alarming. Since Oregon Ballot Measure 110 regarding drug decriminalization was passed, the tools to deal with drug use has been more challenging. They were currently working with other community partners to help educate the community and encouraged all to attend the Town Hall hosted by the Union County Safe Communities Coalition, which was scheduled for Thursday, April 28, 2022, in the La Grande High School Auditorium. The Town Hall would address the rising opioid misuse and prevention of drug use in Union County.

BELL voiced that starting Sunday, April 10<sup>th</sup> to Saturday, April 16<sup>th</sup>, 2022, was 911 Telecommunicators Week, and wanted to honor them in recognizing the importance of the work they all do.

In regards to the drug overdose use, BOZARTH asked if any of the issues were coming from the homeless community, to which BELL said that some were, but not all of them.

Mayor CLEMENTS encouraged the other City Councilors to tour the 911 Dispatch Center because it was interesting to see all of the things they can do, as well as commend them on the work they provide to our community.

GLABE asked if there was anything else that could be done to help aid in the solution for the drug overdose issues in our community, to which BELL stated that if he had other ideas, he would have shared them already. He stated they were working with other community partners and would

continue to communicate and educate when solutions or ideas became available. BELL followed up with examples of how things were now being handled with the passing of Oregon Measure 110.

Mayor CLEMENTS shared that with the support of the grant issued to Union County Safe Communities Coalitions (UCSCC) this year, he was hopeful the tools for outreach and communication within our community would be better. He shared his opinion in regards to helping those with addiction, made suggestions on how to help the youth population engage in healthy activities, and stated there was a short video that UCSCC had recently uploaded to social media and he would send that out to the Councilors in an email.

MIESNER asked if there were enough facilities available to care for people with addiction, to which BELL stated there was not; and she also asked if the State of Oregon was helping to put money into such facilities, to which BELL stated that it has not happened yet.

Chief CORNFORD noted it has been challenging hiring a Firefighter/Paramedic, but was hopeful that two Firefighter/EMT positions would be filled soon, which would put the Fire Department back to full staff.

In regards to the street funding memo that was provided to the Councilors at the beginning of the meeting, STROPE stated he would also email the memo to the Budget Committee Members and Parking, Traffic Safety and Street Maintenance Advisory Commission (PTSSMAC) Members. The memo outlined STROPE's intent to include in the Proposed Budget \$473,818 of one-time funding for Streets and Roads using all of the estimated City General Fund revenues from the potential Urban Renewal Under Levy along with some of the unanticipated increase in General Fund cash that would normally be added to the City's General Fund cash on hand. He reminded the Council that a Joint Work Session was scheduled for Monday, April 18, 2022, to further discuss the street and road funding recommendations from PTSSMAC and gave a brief summary of what was outlined in the memo; a copy of which is now a permanent document in the master file for this Regular Session and by this reference incorporated herewith as if fully set forth.

Mayor CLEMENTS proclaimed the month of April, 2022, as *Arbor Month*.

Mayor CLEMENTS proclaimed the month of May, 2022, as *Poppy Month* and proclaimed May 19, 20, and 21, 2022, as *Poppy Days*.

#### **CITY MANAGER COMMENTS**

#### **CITY COUNCIL COMMENTS**

Mayor CLEMENTS proclaimed the month of April, 2022, as Sexual Assault Awareness Month.

MIESNER asked which roads were going to be worked on this summer, to which CARPENTER named off Hall Street, S Street, Miller Drive, May Lane, to name a few.

Mayor CLEMENTS asked if the closure on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Street viaduct, that runs over the freeway and river, was a state project, to which CARPENTER answered yes. Mayor CLEMENTS stated that he was told the project would be complete by the end of July, 2022, in time for Union County Fair and added that the road was still open to bicyclists and on-foot traffic only. CARPENTER gave a brief summary of what the project entailed and verified that the project should be done by fair time.

GLABE expressed his appreciation to the City's public servants in keeping our community safe.

There being no further business to come before this Regular Session of the Council, Mayor CLEMENTS adjourned the meeting to the Urban Renewal Agency Regular Session at 7:31 p.m. The Council is scheduled to meet again in Regular Session on Wednesday, May 4, 2022, at 6:00 p.m., in the Council Chambers of City Hall, 1000 Adams Avenue, La Grande, Oregon.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LA GRANDE, UNION COUNTY, OREGON, ESTABLISHING THE FINAL ASSESSMENTS TO THE PROPERTY DETERMINED TO BE SPECIFICALLY BENEFITED BY THE 2021 CITY WIDE VOLUNTARY SIDEWALK LOCAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NUMBER 21-066; AND DECLARING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

#### THE CITY OF LA GRANDE ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>. The City Council of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, has considered the final assessments of the property benefited by *City Wide Voluntary Sidewalk Local Improvement District Number 21-066*, which was constructed according to the plans and specifications for the work in said District, heretofore adopted by the City Council of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon.

The City Council of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, hereby ascertains and determines the sum of *Sixteen Thousand Two Hundred Fifty Eight and 00/100* DOLLARS (\$16,258.00) to be the final cost of said Sidewalk Improvements; the real property hereinafter described to be specifically benefited by said improvements; that special and peculiar benefits accrued to each tract within said District; and that said assessments have been apportioned among all of the tracts of said property abutting upon, fronting, contiguous and tributary to such improvements and within the boundaries of the Improvement District created for the purpose of making such improvements to the extent of the benefit of such tract of real property by reason of the improvements and in no case in excess of the benefits received.

<u>Section 2</u>. That the Finance Director or designee of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, is hereby authorized and directed to prepare a special assessment roll in accordance with the foregoing proposed assessments or the proposed assessments as adjusted by the City Council after considering objections thereto.

Section 3. That the Finance Director or designee of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, shall complete the special assessment roll in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance and shall, without delay, by Certified Mail, transmit a Notice of Final Assessment to the owner of the assessed property of the time when such assessment shall become due and also stating that such assessments may be paid in installments, provided each property owner desiring to do so makes application therefor within ten (10) days from the date of such Notice. Said application to pay installments will be made under the provisions of Oregon Revised Statutes, Section 223.205, to and including Section 223.295, commonly known as the *Bancroft Bonding Act*. Interest on the unpaid assessment shall be established by the City Council of the City of La Grande, Union County, Oregon, at a rate not to exceed nine percent (9%) per annum, as set forth by appropriate Oregon law.

<u>Section 4</u>. That such assessment shall become due and payable immediately after the final assessments have been entered into the *City Lien Docket* and shall be delinquent thirty (30) days thereafter if unpaid.


